But we can certainly learn to respect these differences and can evolve mechanism to negotiate these differences.</li> <li>3) Ability to handle social differences , divisions and conflicts is thus a definite plus point of democratic regimes</li> <li>4) Example-Belgium – has successfully negotiated differences among ethnic population. 
