Context:

The Ministry of Road Transport and Highways has launched a Voluntary Vehicle-Fleet Modernisation Programme (VVMP), also known as the Vehicle Scrappage Policy.

What is Vehicle Scrappage Policy?

- The vehicle scrappage policy aims at creating an ecosystem for phasing out unfit and polluting vehicles in an environment friendly and safe manner.
- For instance, old vehicles (commercial vehicles over 15 years old & private vehicles over 20 years old) will have to **undergo a fitness test**. Failing the test would most likely lead to vehicle scrappage.
- Automated fitness centreswould be established throughout the country to ease the vehicle scrapping process.
- Modern automated vehicle scrapping centres (around 60-70) will also be built.
- All government vehicles (including PSUs) will be de-registered after 15 years.

Vehicle Scrappage Policy Need

- It helps in scrapping approximately 1 crore vehicles that are without valid fitness and registration.
- This reduces pollution & would help in India's commitment to the Paris Agreement.
- The current **informal vehicle scrappage industry** needs to be formalized and the policy is a step in this direction.
- It helps in reducing the dependency on imported raw materials & boosts the availability of low-cost raw material for the automotive & steel industries.

Benefits of the policy



- The owners of old vehicles will be paid around 5% of the vehicle's ex-showroom price.
- In addition, they will receive a **rebate of up to 25% on road tax** upon purchase of a new vehicle. In case of commercial vehicles, the road tax rebate will be 15%.
- The policy would **create a viable circular economy** of reuse, recycle and recover and will result in value for all stakeholders.
- It will lead to a rise in demand for new automobiles and help the struggling automobile sector.
- The policy will also help in bringing investments of around Rs 10,000 crore.
- It will lead to the creation of around 35,000 jobs.
- Automated vehicle scrapping centres will help in making India the scrapping hub of South-East Asia.

Conclusion

- The policy aims to boost the sale of **new cars & commercial vehicles**, to **formalize the scrap market**, **to reduce pollution**, among others.
- Thus, buyers will be encouraged to buy environmentally friendly & technologically advanced vehicles.
